Course Description

This course is a study of Theological Prolegomena (introduction, theological method) and Doctrine of Scripture (revelation, inspiration, inerrancy). The course will survey these doctrines first by exegeting Scripture and then seek insights from historical developments and confessions. The goal is to equip pastors, leaders, and church members to trust God's Word so that they are faithful in obedience and able to teach.

Course Objectives

- To introduce students to the foundational biblical truths concerning the Doctrines of Revelation and Scripture.
- To ensure students know and understand the primary passages when studying these doctrines as well as most important historical challenges.
- To help students identify areas in their own worldview that need more clarity and certainty so that they are more faithful in knowing God and themselves.
- To prepare students to defend the faith once for all handed down and to build up the church by strengthening their faith in God's revealed Word. (for BRITE's Theological Foundations, see https://www.brite-va.org/about-brite/)
- To equip students in their worship, discipleship, and faithful service.
- To equip believers to read, interpret, understand, and obey God's Word.
- To equip believers who desire to teach to "hold firm" to the Word and to be "able to teach."

Evaluation

1. Attendance (20%)

Students are expected to be present and prepared to discuss the assigned readings each week. Please contact the instructor if you know you will be absent.

2. Reading (20%)

Students will submit a record of what they read from the course requirements and suggested reading. Extra credit will be given for reading from the suggested section.

4. Four Position/Exegesis Papers (10% each)

Students will answer a significant question using Scripture, historical sources, and commentaries. These papers are designed to help students gain clarity on how to pursue answers from Scripture and be equipped to answer difficult questions that will arise in the life of a church. If a student wishes to answer a question that is not listed below, the instructor must approve it. The papers should be 5-6 pages in length.

Possible Papers

- What is the significance and limitations of General Revelation?
- What is the relationship of Inspiration and Illumination?
- Why do some theologians differentiate between inerrant and infallible?
- How do Father, Son, and/or Spirit each participate in revelation?
- Choose a book of the New Testament and trace the theme of God's Word through it (the pastoral epistles are recommended).
- What does Paul mean by "type" in I Corinthians 10?
- What is the role of mystery in the New Testament (Ephesians 3)?

5. Final Exam (20%)

The examination will test the student's mastery of all the material covered in the course lectures & reading & allow the student to apply principles learned in the course to theological test cases.
